Minutes of the CB #1 Youth Committee meeting

held April 5, 2016 at Brighton Heights Reformed Church 320 St. Marks Place at 7pm

- Kelly Vilar opened the meeting with introductions. Councilmember Debi Rose, the Community Board 1 Chairperson Nicholas Siclari and his First Vice-Chair Anthony Cosentino were present. Additionally representatives from City Comptroller Scott Stringer's office and Public Advocate Letitia James' office were in attendance.
- The minutes of the March 1st meeting were accepted.
- Kelly reported on our Building Schools/Building Seats sub-committee and the upcoming VIP Tour Hosted by CB #1 to the Harbor School on Governors Island Confirmed to attend are representatives of the offices of Councilmember Rose, Councilmember Steven Matteo and Borough President James Oddo along with DOE, CB and youth committee members. The group is exploring possibilities for replicating this school in the form of a middle school on the North Shore.
- Susan Master reported on the Cromwell sub-committee recently met with Councilmember Matteo regarding the effort to get Cromwell funds allocated in the 2017 New York City budget. He asked thoughtful questions and was very empathetic to this issue.
- Kelly recently had the opportunity to interact with Councilmember Mathieu Eugene, chair of the City Council's Youth committee. They chatted about how to bring more resources to our district. He is interested in talking further with our committee about the North Shore Youth Agenda.
- Councilmember Rose commended the Youth Committee on its activism. She also voiced her concern about programs that serve all New Yorkers including Staten Islanders, but have offices in the other boroughs and not Staten Island. Councilmember Rose will make available a list of youth services programs on Staten Island that her office allocates funding, in order for this committee to learn more about their services. Councilmember Rose outlined her priorities in no particular order to include rebuilding Cromwell, support for Richmond University Medical Center (RUMC), and increasing school seats. Councilmember Rose spoke about her upcoming meeting tomorrow (4/6/2016) with the Parks Department in support of the "Rebuild Cromwell" effort. The Councilmember announced that she had put in a budget request for the rebuilding of Cromwell for Fiscal Year 2017. Great applause was made by all in attendance. It was

made clear that this was a request and the ball now in the court of City Council and the Mayor. Councilmember Rose also discussed adolescent beds at RUMC and the need for increased adolescent healthcare on Staten Island. She shared that Staten Island Mental Health Society, a stand-alone children's mental health services agency, will soon be rolled into RUMC. Her concern here was that mental health services were not diminished with this new relationship between RUMC and the Mental Health Society. After the Councilmember Rose's comments, a few minutes were spent on questions and answers.

- Laura Martocci praised an article dated April 4, 2016 in the Staten Island Advance titled "BP Oddo pushes for girls' leadership academy for Staten Island. In the article, the borough president expressed his desire to bring single-gender high-quality education to the young ladies of the borough, similar to that already being provided by Eagle Academy for Young Men.
- Jenny Fischman from the Public Advocate's office, briefed the Youth Committee on Public Advocate James' plan to make childcare affordable in New York City. The plan calls for expanding the current child care tax credit, expanding and dedicating funding for infant & toddler child care slots, creation of the Office of Early Childhood Development, establishing pay equity between DOE and ACS, and ensuring provider stability by negotiating long-term leases with landlords. Jenny requested a letter of support for these initiatives. The committee unanimously approved a letter of support.
- Kevin Elkins of the City Comptroller's Office discussed Comptroller Stringer's early public support for the "Rebuild Cromwell" effort. He discussed the role of the Comptroller's office to manage pensions, audit agencies and negotiate legal settlements involving the city. Kevin then highlighted the finding of the Comptroller's "Dropping the Ball" report. According to the report, nearly one-third of city schools have no full-time certified physical education teacher; 80 percent of co-located schools lack physical fitness space, 149 schools lack both a full-time, certified physical education teacher and a space for physical fitness.
- Tammy Greer Brown reported on the Specialized high school exam prep course recently hosted by SI NAACP and Brighton Heights Reformed Church. Over 30 youngsters participated and with its overwhelming success plans are being made to do it again. Also Tammy praised Staten Islanders who went to Washington as a delegation of New York to meet with Congressional leaders in search of their support of Historically Black Colleges and Universities. She thanked Congressman Donovan in particular who arranged a meeting amongst the HBCU supporters and Congressional officials working on future funding.

What is a Community Board?

Born out of the NYC Charter **community boards of New York City** of the New York City government are the appointed advisory groups from various districts throughout each of the five boroughs of New York City.


Community boards deal with a range of matters, including land use and zoning, identifying community needs as part of the City's budget process, and working with government agencies to improve the local delivery of services. More broadly, all community boards are concerned with any other matter relating to the welfare of the district and its residents. Community boards act in an advisory capacity, wielding no official authority to make or enforce laws.

Each board is composed of 50 volunteer members, each appointed by the local Borough President. Half of the members are nominated by the community district's City Councilmembers.^[1] There are currently 59 community districts, including twelve in Manhattan, twelve in the Bronx, eighteen in Brooklyn, fourteen in Queens, and three in Staten Island.

Community Boards have an important advisory role in dealing with land use and zoning items, the City budget, municipal service delivery, and many other matters relating to their communities' welfare.

Community Board No. 1 Staten Island

Staten Island Community Board 1 is here to improve the quality of life for anyone who lives, works or visits our North Shore community. The boundaries of our district are listed below. The Community Board reviews land use matters, listens and makes recommendations on a variety of community concerns. It is also responsible for assessing the needs of the north shore and making recommendations on the city budget every year.



Community Board No. 1 has several committees that focus on various community issues. CB #1 has Functional Committees that focus on specific issues, complaints or proposals. They are Land Use, Transportation, Health & Human Services, Public Services, Labor, Youth, Civic Associations, Parks, Cultural Affairs and Rules & Legislation. There are also Area Committees that meet regularly to focus on particular communities' complaints and concerns. These Committees include:

-Silver Lake/Sunnyside/Westerleigh
-West-New Brighton/St. George
All committees and full Board meetings are open to the public and allow for non- CB members to participate and comment.





Report of April 12, 2016

1. April

No meeting in April.

2. Bus hearing Monday, March 21, 2016

Transportation Committee Hearing on NYC bus service plans and problems. Present: Nicholas Zvegintzov, Joseph Bird, and Bob Zion (Committee), Chris Rooney and Norman Light (CB1), Melissa Farley and Bus Superintendent Mike Cilmi (MTA), Victoria Giordano (NYC DOT), and several citizens.

The Committee showed a video of buses bypassing passengers on Van Duzer Ave (which was subsequently excerpted on http://www.silive.com/news/index.ssf/2016/03/bus_riders_express_outrage_to.html).

Follow-ups promised by MTA:

- Missed Stops / over-capacity: Investigation in process. Van Duzer / Bay St, Richmond Terrace, Forest Avenue.
- Missed trips: Will follow up with SI trip logs the report from MTA Bus Time data that SI has more missed trips than the NYC average, and that 6 of the 10 routes with highest missed trips include both lines on Richmond Terrace, both lines on Victory Blvd, plus the S42 and S54 serving vulnerable populations.
- Will report on why a Castleton Ave bus stop was moved.
- Non-ambulatory passengers when buses load in the street during snow emergencies: Referred to NYC DOT since bus stop design is a DOT function.

3. Load data request

The Committee has requested from the MTA load data for buses and trains loading and unloading at the SI Ferry Terminal for representative days in July and December 2015 in connection with the ongoing Travel and Traffic on the North Shore study.

4. MTA commits to new West Shore light rail study

Rachel Shapiro reported in http://www.silive.com/news/index.ssf/2016/04/mta_commits_to_new_west_shore.html, that the MTA has committed to a feasibility and route study for the proposed West Shore Light Rail (roughly paralleling the West Shore Expressway, the MLK Expressway, and across the Bayonne Bridge).

This was said to be due to the muscle of State Senator Andrew Lanza ("chairman of the Senate's Infrastructure and Capital Investment Committee, giving the Staten Island lawmaker authority over the MTA capital budget").

Thus the MTA is now committed to serious studies of both the West Shore light rail and of the North Shore busway, the two major new rapid transit proposals for SI.

5. Ticket touts outside the Whitehall Terminal

NYP cleared out aggressive ticket touts from Peter Minuit Plaza by using NYC Parks regulations against soliciting and selling.

Agenda Item - Sustainable Development: Schools

Section 107-121: Public Schools in the South Richmond District was reviewed in the context of future North Shore development. Per Len Garcia Duran, this section of Zoning is rarely used any more. City Planning will present the latest approach to making sure the School Construction Authority (SCA) (and other City Agencies) meet our needs in future plans.

Zoning rules supporting housing development with mandated infrastructure improvements seem to apply if there is a re-zoning of the area proposed for development (the Bay Street Corridor, for example).

The Staten Island Advance ran "Fight for North Shore Education," by CM Debi Rose, on 3/17/16. Ms. Rose notes the SCA's current 5-year plan calls for an additional 824 seats on the North Shore - the location not yet determined. She is looking to fund an additional 1,136 seats, for a total of 1,960.

Discussion: *Right now* we have three big active projects, yielding roughly 1,000 new households, with 180 at Nicholas Estates, 571 at URBV, 250 at Mt. Manressa... plus many, many, many other projects where 2 or more units replace a single home. *Right now* we have reports of overcrowding. *Right now* our facilities are in desperate need of repairs and technological upgrades.

Therefore, notwithstanding City Planning's future presentation on this topic, and notwithstanding the missed deadline for CB1 budget proposals, it was decided we write a letter to all electeds, Federal, state, and local, as well as the Chancellor, expressing our critical need for schools in our Community Board District and requesting immediate relief.

Open Discussion:

The Municipal Arts Society presentation at Pt. Richmond H.S., sponsored by the Northfield LDC, was a good "community empowerment" exercise; they provided extra copies of their booklet "Who gets it Done & How" for our meeting.

Garbage/Litter remains a problem; the Dep't of Sanitation installs street cans and then removes them (or they're stolen). A letter should be written to Sanitation.

The group brainstormed ideas for Skyline Homeowners' Association, which faces in rem proceedings.

The meeting started off with a liquor license application by Daddy-o's on the bay. They presented their plan for operating a southern bbq restaurant which drew no opposition and passed 9 yes- 0 no.

There were no restrictions placed on license though they were warned about potential for noise complaints if operating outdoor dining.

There were 3 license renewals. Cuckoos Nest at Wagner College – no apparent problems reported to board. Passed 9-0

Panini Grill- no representation- letter of no support due to no rep at meeting

Cinderellas Restaurant- no complaints on record- votes 8 yes/ 1 abstain

The committee decided that the policy of having representatives from new license applications as well as renewals needs to be spelled out clearly for applicants.

Community concerns: Jennie Meagher noted that Hobrah on Forest Ave had outdoor amplified music.

And was serving alcohol outdoors in apparent violation of their license and the NYPD was notified but took no action. The committee suggests the board request a copy of each establishments license to keep on file to reference conditions placed on it. This should be part of application/renewal process. The board needs to investigate whether Hobrah obtained one day permit for outdoor service and see if C of O was modified to permit parking lot to be used for dining/service.

It was noted by Joan Cusack that Daddy-o's had been cited by Dept. of buildings for non-permitted construction it may affect their opening date.

There were questions about 3 houses being built at Elizabeth/ Clove Lake Place– when was it approved?

Linda Eskenas spoke of safety problems , school buses parked on street and parked tractor trailers at Alaska St (west of Broadway) on Richmond terrace. Needs to be documented somehow to take action.

Joe Meagher again brought up his complaints about Sharon Ave/ Forest Ave intersection. Transportation committee chair Nick Z promised to look into it.

An out of sync traffic light at Harvest Avenue and Bement Avenue was reported. One side short green.- delayed green?

There was a complaint about fast car traffic on Bard Ave.- substantiated by co-chair. Alert DOT about problem- signage?

No news on lakeside manor. Meeting with c.b. 1 chair?
